- Specialized expertise
- Effective Response to Mental Health, Other Disorders (Elder, Juvenile, and addiction) Training
- Timely and professional response
- Intensive state-certified training
- Effectively implement a bridge to utilize community partnerships
- Education on how to strategically work with the person in crisis to gain compliance to obtain the assistance they might need.

Benefits of CIT

- Crisis response is timely
- The person with a "lived" experience learn what to expect from CIT officers
- Bridge of service if effected to citizens and service providers
- Competence on CIT calls with situation and working with other professionals involved (FD, ER staff, Thrive)
- Officers gain confidence from new skills acquired or current skills reinforced
- Discretionary arrest rates decrease
- Involuntary hospitalizations decrease
- Officer and consumer injury likelihood decrease
- Use-of-force generally decreases on CIT calls
- SWAT and other use-of-force callouts decrease

CIT Role-Play

- Certified CIT officers working with professional actors
- Realistic scenarios
- Actors "feed off of" actions by officers
- Prompt, professional feedback within scenario environment
- Videotaped action in all scenarios
- Produce "Greatest Hits" video of positive experiences and discuss as a group
- Determines who receives CIT certification

Other relevant issues

- Initially, CIT is voluntarily chosen by law enforcement agencies and the Oak Park Police readily took advantage of the opportunity.
- The Safe T Act, now mandates Illinois police departments to have crisis intervention training.
- Importance of scenario-based role play process to determine skills
- Interagency CIT Agreements ("Team" in CIT)
- Refresher course for CIT officers
- CIT training for Telecommunicators, and other emergency responders

OPPD CIT Response Model

Call for a Crisis Arrive on scene Requests to go to the hospital for a Mental Health evaluation Complete **Initial Risk Assessment OPFD** transports NO immediate threat to Passive thoughts Immediate danger to hospital harm self or others but of harm to self of harm to self or other underlining issue or others, etc. others (hallucinations, paranoia, anxiety, etc.) Thrive is **OPFD** transports paged to hospital CIT skills used, Determines follow up level of services intervention provided. **OPFD Provides** transports to resources hospital
