Turning over a new leaf: Village to modernize fall leaf collection

eginning this fall, the Village is modernizing its Fall Leaf Collection Program to improve safety, help the environment and provide residents with more choices for how to handle leaves.

The modernization of the Fall Leaf Collection Program — the first since 1994 — will address resident concern over the potential safety hazards created by leaf piles, streamline the leaf collection pickup process and reduce confusion over parking restrictions. The changes come after the Village conducted case studies of 150 Illinois municipalities to identify best practices for leaf collection.

Oak Park's annual fall leaf collection period typically runs from late October to early December. Previously the Village used a pile model in which large piles of loose leaves were consolidated at street corners for collection.

This year, residents will no longer place leaves in the street near the curb. Instead, they are able to choose from a variety of leaf collection options that will improve safety, sustainability and efficiency. These options include:

- Bagging fallen leaves in yard waste bags and/or rigid containers and placing them in the parkway by the curb — no yard waste sticker required
- Composting leaves via the Village's CompostAble program
- Mulching leaves with a mower
- Leaving the leaves on the lawn or gardens to decompose naturally

In addition to offering choice for residents, the changes are anticipated to provide benefits such as increased tree and soil health through mulching, enhanced public safety by removing leaf piles to improve visibility on streets and in the public way, and potential reduction in costs for collection. The changes will also resolve inconvenient parking disruption caused by overnight leaf-pushing and daytime collection of piles that previously created disproportionate reduction of parking in affected areas.

Under the new system, the Village's residential waste

hauler, Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS), will have dedicated compost trucks and leaf crews that will collect bags and empty rigid landscape containers from the parkway according to the route and schedule set by Public Works staff. A Village-wide make-up day is included in the weekly Fall Leaf Collection schedule to supplement areas with higher leaf volumes or to catchup after inclement weather events.

As part of the transition, the Village is planning to expand its Sidewalk Shoveling Program — typically used to assist income-eligible residents that physically cannot shovel show nor afford to hire a shoveling service — to also assist with fall leaf services.

The Village will broadly communicate additional details about the changes via its website, social media channels, e-newsletter, the OP/FYI newsletter, local media outlets and more. Staff will also attend community events during the coming months to discuss the changes with residents and answer questions in person.


Recycle electronics, hazardous waste

esidents in single-family homes and buildings with five or fewer units can schedule a special collection of electronic and hazardous household waste. Examples of hazardous household waste that can be safely disposed of include oil-based paints, aerosols, household cleaners, lawn chemicals and automotive chemicals. Electronic waste such as portable electronics, computer items and TV items will also be collected. Residents of large multifamily buildings not served under the municipal refuse hauling program are encouraged to contact their building's refuse provider about recycling options. Vehicle license deadline nears

very Oak Park resident is required to purchase a license for each owned or leased motor vehicle before July 15. Vehicle licenses can be purchased and renewed online at www.oak-park.us/vehiclelicense. Vehicle license rates vary by type of vehicle. Persons age 65 and older, and anyone who has a state-issued handicapped license plate or placard, can apply for a discount. Disabled and active-duty veterans with proper documentation can apply for free vehicle licenses. The rate increases by \$20 after the deadline. Daytime restrictions eased for vehicle license holders...Oak Park residents with an active Village vehicle license can override daytime parking restrictions posted on the blocks where they live. The exemption from daytime parking restrictions is intended to provide relief to residents from undue burden created by parking restrictions that are intended to regulate parking for non-residents and commuters. The daytime parking exemption does not override other posted regulations related to traffic, public safety, permit parking and other paid parking zones. The diagram below illustrates how the exemption applies to a typical residential block face, with the star representing a residence and the dotted lines representing the street frontages on which a resident is exempt from applicable daytime restrictions.



Guidance for storm debris pickup varies

Summer is an active period for storms in the Midwest, and severe storms often result in fallen tree branches. If a branch falls from a parkway tree located between the curb and sidewalk, please contact the Public Works Department at 708.358.5700 or publicworks@oak-park.us so the Village is aware of the issue and can pick up the debris. Officials ask residents to not cut up branches from parkway trees as it is faster for crews to feed one large branch into the wood chipper than many smaller pieces. The Village does not pick up brush from trees on private property. If you have a small amount of private brush to dispose of, you can bundle it, attach a green yard waste sticker and set it out in the regular collection area for regular garbage and recycling pickup. Bundles should be no larger than two feet in diameter or four feet in length and not weigh more than 50 pounds. If you have a larger amount of private brush, contact a tree care or landscape maintenance contractor for assistance. options...Making fresh produce affordable for all patrons is a priority at the Oak Park Farmers' Market, which has been providing SNAP/LINK card processing since 2011. The Market also offers matching value coupons throughout the season. For each dollar SNAP/LINK participants spend, they receive a \$1 coupon up to a maximum of \$25 in coupons per cardholder per Market day. Many vendors also accept WIC and Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program coupons.

Transportation available for seniors...Oak Park Township offers rides for seniors to and from the Oak Park Farmers' Market throughout the season. Pickups are made from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. each Saturday for seniors who live in Oak Park and River Forest. Reservations for rides to the Market can be made by calling 708.383.4806 between 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A \$1 donation is suggested.

Gas-powered leaf blowers prohibited during summer months

he Village is reminding residents and landscape companies operating in Oak Park that the use of gas-powered leaf blowers is prohibited from June through September. The community is also less than one year away from a permanent ban of the use of gaspowered leaf blowers that will go into effect June 1, 2025. Currently, gas-powered leaf blowers may be operated only between October 1 and May 31. Electric leaf blowers may be used year-round. The operation of all leaf blower equipment is allowed Monday-Friday between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. and on Saturday and Sunday between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. All leaf blowers must operate below 65 dB. Façade improvement grants available

Applications for grants to help commercial businesses improve and restore the facades of their buildings are available. Qualified participants can receive up to \$5,000 in grant assistance for each eligible façade. Health News

Summer sun safety... Keep yourself and your family safe from the sun's dangerous UVA and UVB rays when enjoying the outdoors this summer. Health officials advise everyone to use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher. Reapply every two hours or after swimming or sweating.

Beat the heat and stay hydrated... Staying hydrated during the warm summer months is an important part of enjoying the season while staying healthy. Whether your plans include more walks or bicycle rides, soaking up the sun, or taking a long-awaited vacation, make sure you drink enough water to stay hydrated. The average adult should drink 8 to 13 cups of water per day for optimal hydration.

Back-to-school immunization... Local health officials are reminding parents and caregivers that all children attending Illinois schools, both public and private, need to show proof of required immunizations in order to attend class each fall. Failure to do so may result in exclusion from school. Parents and caregivers may contact the Oak Park Public Health Department at 708.358.5480 or **health@oak-park.us** with questions about which immunizations are required, and how to access free or reduced cost vaccines for those who are un- or under-insured.

Fight the bite this West Nile season

As temperatures rise, so does the threat of the mosquito-borne West Nile Virus. Last year, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 119 human cases, 62 of which were in Cook County, and six deaths.

Take precautions... Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes by wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active and using insect repellant that contains DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol. Residents also are urged to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites by cleaning roof gutters, storing containers upside down, emptying birdbaths every few days and any other precautions to avoid standing water on their property. Report dead birds...If you see a dead bird call the West Nile Virus Hotline at 708.358.5694 or email **health@oak-park.us**. Depending on the bird's condition and species, a Health Department staff member may pick up the carcass for testing.

Prevention efforts...The Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District treats all street catch basins with larvicide every seven to 10 days during the mosquito-breeding season. The abatement district also will treat catch basins on private property by request and pick up old vehicle tires. Call 708.447.1765 or visit **www.desplainesvalleymad.com** for more information.

Spraying notification...Residents who wish to be notified when the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District has scheduled spraying for adult mosquitoes can sign up at www.oak-park.us/notifyme. Registrants will be notified by an automated telephone system, email and/or text message as soon as possible following a decision to spray in Oak Park. Individuals without computer access may call 708.358.5694 to leave their phone number for telephone notification only. Spraying is only conducted in response to elevated levels of West Nile Virus in an area. Visit www.desplainesvalleymad.com for information about spraying.

Sculpture Walk will be on display until spring 2025 and features the work of artists from throughout the Midwest. The sculptures were chosen through a juried competition and vary in materials. Visitors will be able to download the free Otocast apponto their smartphones to access information about the sculptures and hear descriptions of the work by the artists. The Sculpture Walk is organized by the Oak Park Area Arts Council.

Oak Park's permanent public art collection grows...The Village's zoning ordinance requires that either a piece of public art be installed at the site of any new planned development or that a donation be made that would lead to the installation of public art within Oak Park. Sculptures were

Police offer tips to deter bicycle thieves

Dicycle thefts tend to increase during warmer weather. Following these steps, police say, can help deter bicycle thieves:

- Register your bike with the Police Department at www.oak-park.us/ bikeregistration. Should your bike be stolen and later recovered, the registration provides information about its rightful owner.
- Don't leave your bike unlocked or unattended. Police recommend a U lock.
- Lock your bike even when it is stored in a closed garage, enclosed porch or basement common area.
- Never let anyone you do not know take your bike for a ride.
- Trust your instincts. If you feel someone is going to take your bicycle, shout for help.
- Stay in the company of friends there usually is safety in numbers.
- Think twice about resisting your bike can be replaced.

Bicycles and sidewalks...Riding on a sidewalk by anyone of any age is not allowed in the business districts, including downtown. And only those under 15 years of age may ride on a sidewalk anywhere else in the community. Youngsters riding on sidewalks always must yield to pedestrians. Helmets required... Bicyclists under age 17 are required to wear a helmet in Oak Park. Enforcement focuses on education rather than punishment, but parents of repeat offenders could face a \$25 fine or be required to do community service. The local law is based on information from the American Academy of Pediatrics, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and National Highway Traffic and Safety Administration about injuries and deaths caused by bicyclists who have accidents while riding without a helmet. Renew pet licenses online



ak Park Public Health officials urge residents to use the online option at www.oak-park. **us/villageview** to renew their pet licenses. Renewing online is quick and easy. Residents can delete pets they no longer own and add new ones. Payment is made with a credit card, a receipt is sent via email and the actual tag delivered to your mailbox. Pet owners whose pets were already licensed and who had emails on file with the Village should have received a renewal notice. First-time pet owners should also register pets online. Pet owners still have the option of mailing in a paper renewal notice and payment, or coming to Village Hall, 123 Madison St. For more information about owning a pet in Oak Park, visit www.oak-park. us/pets. Bee allergy registry... The Village allows residents to keep bees on their property, but will not issue a permit for an apiary on a property within 150 feet of a residence of a person with an anaphylactic reaction to bee stings. If you have been diagnosed with such an allergy by a licensed physician, please provide documentation to the Public Health Department at health@oak-park.us. Sign up for emergency alerts... The Village maintains an alert system to notify residents when emergency situations occur. The system requires residents to register, but allows citizens to choose how they wish to be notified — by text, email and/or voice message. The system is intended for emergency notifications, not news or general information. Tips for planning a great block party

The Village encourages block parties as a way to build community spirit, meet neighbors and have fun. Each block may sponsor two block parties per year, but since some weekends fill quickly, plan early to get preferred dates. A petition signed by at least 10 separate addresses on the block is required to schedule a block party. Approved petitions allow the neighborhood to close off a street to vehicle traffic for the entire day. Block party organizers are urged to remember the following rules:



- Include everyone on the block especially renters in multifamily buildings.
- Use a north-south block. Due to public safety and traffic considerations, block parties are not allowed on east-west streets.
- Make sure emergency vehicles can get through if needed. Tables, chairs or other items should not project more than six feet from the curb. And don't stretch wires, ropes, nets, lights, banners or other items across the street.
- Supervise children at all times. Even though the street may be closed, accidents can happen.
- Use only street barricades provided by the Village. Cars parked in a street as a barricade may impede emergency vehicles and could be ticketed.
- Keep sidewalks clear. Sidewalks are public ways that may not be obstructed even during a block party.
- Use only chalk for street and sidewalk art.
- If alcohol is present, keep it on private property. Alcohol may not be sold.

Residents who sign up for a green block party receive a kit that includes compostable bags and pop-up waste sorting boxes with signage indicating what waste goes where.
