

Community Survey: Report of Results

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Executive Summary

Survey Background

The Village of Oak Park Community Survey was conducted by phone with a representative sample of residents of the Village of Oak Park. Interviews were performed from September 11, 2000 through September 27, 2000. A total of 802 completed surveys were obtained, providing a response rate of 27%. The 95 percent confidence level around 802 responses is plus or minus 3½ percentage points around any given proportion reported for the entire sample.

Survey participants were asked to rate their satisfaction with the quality of life in the Village, the community's amenities and with local government. The questionnaire also included items pertaining to issues facing the community.

Although responses to many of the evaluative questions were made on a 4 point scale with 4 representing the best rating and 1 the worst, many of the results in this summary are reported on a common scale where 0 is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported "excellent", then the result would be 100 on the 100-point scale. Likewise, if all respondents gave a "poor" rating, the result would be 0 on the 100-point scale. If, for example, the average rating for quality of life was "good", then the result would be 67 on a 100-point scale.

Quality of Community Life

Residents of Oak Park interviewed for this study were very positive about the quality of life in the Village. Forty-four percent rated the overall quality of life in the community as "excellent"; 49% gave it a "good" rating. On a 100-point scale, the average rating was 79. Average ratings of the neighborhood were also fairly high, 76 on a 100-point scale.

Oak Park received favorable ratings as a place to raise children, 82 on a 100-point scale on average. This was significantly higher compared to norms taken from communities across the nation, and compared to Midwestern peer communities of a similar size to Oak Park.

However, Oak Park was not viewed as positively as a place to retire, receiving lower ratings on average (58 on a 100-point scale) compared to national and peer community norms. Within Oak Park, though, those 65 and older gave more positive ratings to Oak Park as a place to retire than did younger respondents.

When asked why they chose to live in Oak Park, nearly a quarter of respondents cited the quality of the schools. Other frequently mentioned motivations included the diversity of the people (22%), the proximity to Chicago (17%) and the attractiveness of the community (15%).

Favorable evaluations were given to the openness and acceptance of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds, the overall appearance of Oak Park, and the sense of community felt in the Village.

Public Safety

A variety of questions were asked related to public safety. Respondents were asked how they perceived their own personal safety. Over half of respondents felt "very safe" from fires, while only 5% felt unsafe. Almost a third felt very safe from violent crimes, and over half felt at least somewhat safe. About one in five respondents felt unsafe from property crimes, but two-thirds felt at least somewhat safe from property crimes.

Crime and use of tobacco by youth were judged "moderate" problems on average (average ratings of 53 and 52, respectively, on a 100-point scale). Crime was rated as somewhat more of a problem by Oak Park residents compared to communities across the nation.

The public safety services offered by the Village of Oak Park received favorable ratings on average. Fire services and emergency medical services received average ratings of 82 on a 100-point scale. Police services were also positively rated, with an average rating of 75 on a 100-point scale, significantly higher than the national norm.

Crime prevention services were given a somewhat lower rating than police services, 66 on a 100-point scale, but this was significantly higher compared to the national norm.

Local Government and City Services

Public safety services were not the only services addressed on the questionnaire. Respondents were also queried about their trust in local government.

During the course of the interview, respondents were read two statements about the Village of Oak Park, and asked whether they agreed or disagreed with these statements. The first item asked whether residents were pleased with the overall direction that the Village of Oak Park is taking. Three-quarters of respondents agreed with this statement, and it received an average rating of 70 on a 100-point scale. This is significantly higher than the national norm.

Respondents were also asked whether they thought the Village of Oak Park government welcomes citizen involvement. Three-quarters of respondents agreed with this statement as well, and it received an average rating of 70 on a 100-point scale.

Approximately two-thirds of survey respondents would rate the overall quality of services provided by the Village of Oak Park as "good". Just over 20% would rate them as "excellent". Only 1% would give a "poor" rating to the Village services.

A list of services was read to respondents, who then evaluated the quality of each. Several services were rated by Oak Park residents significantly more positively than the national norm. No service ratings were significantly lower than the national norms.

In addition to the public safety services previously mentioned, the services rated as significantly more positive than the national norms included:

- · Street cleaning
- · Public health services
- · Water and sewer services
- · Street lighting
- · Animal control

Ratings of Village Employees

All respondents were asked whether they had had any contact, by phone or in-person, with a Village of Oak Park employee within the past year. About three-quarters said they had. This proportion is quite similar to that found in the 1988 Community Survey, when 70% of respondents reported having had contact with Village Hall. Further inquiries were made of these individuals about their impression of Village employees.

Most residents who had contact with a Village employee were favorably impressed. A third thought the employees were "excellent", and 44% thought they were "good".

Comparisons of the ratings given by Oak Park residents to local government employees compared to the national norms show that Oak Park employees are perceived as more courteous and more responsive than local government employees overall.

Traffic and Parking Issues

Several items on the survey dealt with travel and parking issues within Oak Park. Respondents were asked whether they thought these issues were an extreme, major, moderate or minor problem, or not a problem at all.

Sixty-one percent of survey participants considered traffic to be a moderate, major or extreme problem. Even more, over three-quarters, felt that parking was a moderate, major or extreme problem. Average ratings for these items was significantly lower compared to national norms.

Ease of travel in Oak Park by bicycle was considered "excellent" by about one in five of the survey participants. However, a third felt that bicycle travel was only "fair" or "poor".

Survey participants were asked whether they thought the Village of Oak Park should eliminate the current ban on overnight parking. Almost twice as many people supported continuing the ban on overnight parking (60%) as favored eliminating it (35%).

There were large differences in opinions based on whether respondents owned or rented their residence. Two-thirds of renters supported elimination of the ban, while only a third of owners did so.

Economic Development

Economic development issues were addressed in several places on the questionnaire. Those interviewed were asked to rate the shopping opportunities in Oak Park. Shopping opportunities were rated as "excellent" by just over 10% of those completing interviews. Close to half thought the shopping was "good" in Oak Park. The average rating on a 100-point scale was 54, significantly lower than the national norm.

Forty percent of respondents had purchased items other than food or groceries within Oak Park about twice a month or more in the past year. This was a small decrease from 1988, when 47% of respondents reported shopping in Oak Park for non-food items at least twice a month.

Over half of the survey respondents had made two or more purchases over the Internet in the past 12 months.

When asked what they felt the effect of economic development has been on the overall quality of life in Oak Park, close to three-quarters of those interviewed responded that the effect has been a positive one. The effect was deemed negative by 7% of respondents, 13% thought their had been no impact, and 8% were unsure.

Survey participants were also asked what they felt the impact of economic development had been on residential property. A majority (55%) felt the impact was positive; 12% thought the effect was negative, and 20% thought there was no impact. Thirteen percent were unsure.

In general, residents were satisfied with the efforts of the Village of Oak Park to promote economic development: 60% were "somewhat satisfied", and 21% were "very satisfied". Twelve percent were dissatisfied, and 7% did not know enough to answer the question.

Ratings of shopping opportunities in Oak Park were correlated with opinions about economic development. Those who positively viewed the shopping available in Oak Park were also more likely to feel that economic development has a positive impact on quality of life, and to be satisfied with the Village's economic development efforts.

Diversity

One of the distinctive features of Oak Park is its historic commitment to diversity. Resident viewpoints about the openness of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds, and their perceptions about interactions between people of different races were elicited. These aspects of community life were generally rated favorably (average ratings of 77 and 67, respectively, on a 100-point scale), and these ratings were significantly higher than the national norms.

Differences by respondents' racial background were observed. African Americans gave lower ratings on average to these characteristics than did Non-Hispanic Whites or those of other racial backgrounds. However, there were no statistically significant differences in ratings of overall quality of life in Oak Park or in ratings of the "sense of community" in Oak Park.

Very few people considered the racial balance in the schools to be a "major" or "extreme" problem (9%); though just over a quarter of respondents thought it was a "moderate" problem.

Accessibility of buildings and services within Oak Park to people with disabilities was given an average rating between "good" and "fair". However, individuals with a long-term disability, or who were living with someone who has a long-term disability, gave lower ratings to accessibility than those persons without disabilities.

Several questions directly addressed the issue of diversity in Oak Park. Overwhelmingly residents believe that an ethnically diverse community is very important (71%). This is an even greater proportion than in 1988, when 50% of respondents felt that it was "very important" to maintain an ethnically diverse community.

More than three-quarters of respondents consider it necessary to continue the promotion of racial and ethnic diversity in Oak Park. This, too, is a greater percentage than found in 1988, when 67% of respondents felt that promotion of diversity was still needed.

While people of all racial backgrounds believe it is important to maintain an ethnically diverse community, and to continue to promote diversity, this sentiment is even stronger among people of Non-White racial backgrounds.

Community Participation and Public Information

Three quarters of those interviewed had used the Oak Park public libraries more than once, and one in five respondents were frequent users, utilizing the public libraries more than 26 times in the past year.

Over half of those surveyed had taken advantage of the Park District Recreation Centers at least two times in the past 12 months.

Even though these services are not provided by the Village of Oak Park, survey participants were asked to assess the quality of these services. Library services and park and recreational programming were given favorable ratings, 80 and 78, respectively, on a 100-point scale. These represent significantly higher ratings than the national norms.

Those who had used the Oak Park public libraries 2 or more times in the past year gave higher ratings on average to Oak Park's library services than did those who had used the libraries less than 2 times in the past year.

Similarly, survey respondents who had visited the Oak Park Park District recreation centers 2 or more times in the past year viewed park and recreational programs more favorably than did those who had visited less than twice.

Just over a quarter of respondents reported having watched a Board meeting, public meeting, or other cable-television programming related to Village matters two or more times in the past year.

When asked where they do get their information, the most common sources of information about the Village of Oak Park are *The Wednesday Journal* and *The Oak Leaves*. About 40% of those surveyed get "a lot" of their news from these sources. Approximately a third get their information from the OP-FYI Newsletter and other Village mailings.

The frequency of use of these sources has remained relatively unchanged since 1988, except that use of *The Oak Leaves* has decreased since 1988, while the utilization of Village mailings by residents has increased.

In addition to being questioned about their participation in various community activities, survey respondents were asked how informed they were about the community, and where they got their information.

When asked how informed they felt about what goes on in Oak Park, close to a quarter of respondents reported they felt they were "very informed". Seventeen percent said they were not very informed.

The proportion of the population that feels informed about Oak Park has declined since 1988, when almost a third said they felt "very informed" about Oak Park matters.

Penetration of computers and Internet access into Oak Park's households was assessed. Four of every five respondents had access to a computer in their home. Most of these also had Internet access at home, so that approximately three-quarters of respondents had access to the Internet from their home.

Regardless of whether or not they have Internet access at home, very few survey respondents got "a lot" of their information about Oak Park from the website (3%). However, a quarter of those with home Internet access get at least some of their information about the community from the website. Only 10% of those who do not have access to the Internet at home have gotten some of their information from the website.

Home Internet access was also correlated with shopping on-line. Two-thirds of those who can connect to the Internet at home had made two or more purchases from the Internet in the past year, compared to only 14% of those without Internet access at home.

Report of Results

Survey Background

The Village of Oak Park Community Survey provided an opportunity for a representative sample of residents to rate their satisfaction with the quality of life in the Village, the community's amenities and with local government. The survey also permitted residents an opportunity to provide feedback to government on a few issues facing the community.

Understanding the Results

Survey Method

Approximately 3,900 randomly selected phone numbers were purchased for the Oak Park area from a company specializing in phone survey services. Phone interviews were conducted from September 11, 2000 through September 27, 2000. A majority of the interviews were completed during the evening hours and on weekends. All phone numbers were dialed at least three times before being taken out of the sample, with at least one of the attempts on either a weekend or weekday evening. Of the 2,994 eligible households, 802 completed the interview providing a response rate of 27%.

Survey results were weighted so that unit type, age and gender were represented in the proportions reflective of the entire community. (For more information see Appendix III. A copy of the survey instrument, with percent responses displayed, is included in Appendix IV.)

Precision of Estimates

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a "level of confidence" (or margin of error). The 95 percent confidence level for this survey of 802 residents is generally no greater than plus or minus 3½ percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample.

Comparison Data

This report contains comparisons of the survey results to other sources of information. National Research Center, Inc. has collected citizen surveys conducted in over 300 jurisdictions in the United States. Responses to over 4,000 survey questions dealing with resident perceptions about the quality of community life and services provided by local government were recorded, analyzed and stored in an electronic database. This database has provided two sources of information: national norms and "peer community" norms. These peer communities were identified as places with populations between 30,000 and 75,000 in the states of Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin. Using these criteria, results of surveys from 25 communities were included. Of course, not every community asked the same questions as those included on the Oak Park survey, and for some questions no community, or very few, asked a similar question. The total number of communities included in each comparison, national and "peer", is shown in the tables that accompany the graphs.

Where appropriate, comparisons have also been made to other surveys conducted of Oak Park residents. Most significant is the 1988 Community Survey conducted by the Village of Oak Park. Comparisons to several other surveys have also been included.

Putting Evaluations Onto a 100-Point Scale


Although responses to many of the evaluative questions were made on a 4 point scale with 4 representing the best rating and 1 the worst, many of the results in this summary are reported on a common scale where 0 is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported "excellent", then the result would be 100 on the 100-point scale. Likewise, if all respondents gave a "poor" rating, the result would be 0 on the 100-point scale. If, for example, the average rating for quality of life was "good", then the result would be 67 on a 100-point scale. The 95 percent confidence interval around an average score on the 100-point scale will be no greater than plus or minus 2 points based on all respondents.

Interpreting Results

On a report card, an "A" mark is usually a 90 or above. Few services actually receive ratings as high as 90 on the 100-point scale, in part, because certain kinds of services tend to be thought less well of by residents in many communities across the country. Other services get better ratings. Police protection tends to be better received than street maintenance by residents of most American cities. Where possible, the better comparison is not from one service to another in Oak Park, but from Oak Park services to services like them provided by other jurisdictions. This way we can better understand if "good" is good enough for Oak Park service evaluations. Quality of Community Life


Residents of Oak Park interviewed for the community survey were asked to evaluate various aspects of their community. The first question posed asked how they would describe the overall quality of life in the Village of Oak Park. The response was very positive; 44% said the quality of life was "excellent", and almost half said it was "good". Only 7% rated the quality of life as "fair" or "poor".



Survey participants were also asked to rate the quality of their neighborhood, and Oak Park as a place to raise children, and as a place to retire. Neighborhood ratings were also high, though not quite as a high as for the community as a whole. Over half of respondents felt that Oak Park is an "excellent" place to raise children. Sentiment was less positive for Oak Park as a place to retire, with over a third considering Oak Park only a "fair" or even "poor" place to retire.

These ratings can be converted to a 100-point scale where 100 represents "excellent" and 0 represents "poor" to allow comparisons to national and peer community norms. Compared to the nation as a whole, and peer communities of similar size in Midwestern states, Oak Park's quality of life ratings were similar. However, residents of Oak Park rated their community as a better place to raise children, but as a worse place to retire.





For the purpose of examining survey results by geographic location within the Village of Oak Park, survey respondents were asked whether they lived east or west of East Avenue, and north or south of Lake Street. Quality of life ratings given by residents within these four quadrants were quite similar. However, differences were found in assessments of the quality of the neighborhood. Average ratings were higher among those who lived west of East Avenue than among those who lived east of East Avenue.





Some differences were also observed by the race of the respondent. Non-Hispanic Whites gave higher ratings to the quality of their neighborhood than did respondents of other racial backgrounds. However, African Americans and people of other racial backgrounds gave somewhat higher ratings of Oak Park as a place to retire. There were no statistically significant differences in ratings of the overall quality of life by race.





Individuals living with teenagers gave somewhat higher ratings on average to Oak Park as a place to raise children than did those who did not live with teenagers.

Survey participants who were aged 65 or older, or who were living with someone aged 65 or older gave higher ratings to Oak Park as a place to retire than did those who were younger than 65, or who did not live with seniors.

Ratings of Characteristics of Oak Park

Respondents were asked to evaluate a variety of aspects about the Village of Oak Park. Favorable evaluations were given to the openness and acceptance of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds, the overall appearance of Oak Park, and the sense of community felt in the Village.

Interactions between people of different races was rated positively, with about a quarter of respondents feeling these interactions were "excellent", and over half considering them "good".

Ease of travel in Oak Park by bicycle was considered "excellent" by about one in five of the survey participants. However, a third felt that bicycle travel was only "fair" or "poor".


A significant majority of those interviewed thought that access to buildings and services to individuals with disabilities was "good" and 15% thought it was "excellent", but a quarter rated access as only "fair" or "poor".

About 60% of individuals surveyed judged the quality of cable television service in Oak Park as "good" or better.

Shopping opportunities were rated as "excellent" by just over 10% of those completing interviews. Close to half thought the shopping was "good" in Oak Park.

Oak Park gave higher ratings to interactions between people of different races and to the openness of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds than did residents from other parts of the country. Ease of traveling by bicycle in the community was given slightly lower ratings on average. Residents of the Village of Oak Park gave quite significantly lower ratings of shopping opportunities, by about 13 points, compared to other communities across the nation.





No statistically significant differences in ratings given to these aspects of the community were seen when examined by location of the respondent within the Village of Oak Park. (See Appendix II.)

Accessibility of buildings and services within Oak Park to people with disabilities was given an average rating between "good" and "fair". However, individuals with a long-term disability, or living with someone who has a long term disability, gave lower ratings to accessibility than those without disabilities.

When asked why they chose to live in Oak Park, nearly a quarter of respondents cited the quality of the schools. Other frequently mentioned motivations included the diversity of the people (22%), the proximity to Chicago (17%) and the attractiveness of the community (15%).

A 1993 Village survey of all new residents to the Village asked respondents why they had chosen to move to the community. A large proportion mentioned the schools (36%) and "integration" (28%). The most frequently mentioned reason on the 1993 New Resident Survey, though, was "location" (59%), which may be similar to the categories "my family lives here", "my job was here (or nearby)", "close to Chicago" or "access to public transportation". In 1993, 40% referred to the "style of the community", which was cited by respondents to this 2000 survey as the attractiveness of the community, or the progressive spirit of the community.

Many of the survey respondents are long-time members of the community, with half having lived here more than 10 years and almost a third living here over 21 years. About a quarter of respondents have resided in Oak Park 5 years or less.



The table below shows the frequency of reasons given for choosing to live in Oak Park by the respondents' length of residency in Oak Park. Those who had lived in Oak Park longer were more likely to have chosen Oak Park because of the good schools. Those who moved here more recently were more likely to have chosen the community because of its proximity to Chicago and because their job was in Oak Park or close by. Those who moved to Oak Park between 6 to 10 years ago were more likely to have done so because of the diversity of people, compared to people who moved here less than 6 years ago, or more than 10 years ago.



Perceptions of Safety

Resident perceptions about safety in Oak Park were assessed by the survey. Over half of respondents felt "very safe" from fires, while only 5% felt unsafe. Almost a third felt very safe from violent crimes, and over half felt at least somewhat safe. About one in five respondents felt unsafe from property crimes, but two-thirds felt at least somewhat safe from property crimes.

Feelings of safety from fires and from violent crimes were similar by geographic location within the Village. However, those in the northwest and southeast quadrant were more likely to feel safe from property crime, while those in the other two quadrants, particularly the northeast, were somewhat more likely to feel unsafe.





Potential Problems

A list of potential problems in Oak Park was presented to survey participants, who were asked how much of a problem they believed each item to be. The items most frequently identified as problems were parking and traffic. These are often viewed as a problem in other communities, but Oak Park residents were significantly more likely to regard them as such compared to national norms, and to peer communities. Parking is considered a particularly bothersome feature of Oak Park life for residents.

Crime and use of tobacco by youth were judged "moderate" problems on average. Crime was rated as somewhat more of a problem by Oak Park residents (52 on a 100-point scale, where 0 corresponds to "extreme problem" and 100 corresponds to "not a problem") compared to communities across the nation (62 on a 100-point scale).

Noise, racial balance in the schools, dilapidated buildings and graffiti were given average ratings between "moderate" and "minor" problems. These ratings were similar to the national norms.



When these problems are examined by geographic location within the Village, few differences were seen (see graph on next page). Use of tobacco by youth was more likely to be seen as a problem by those north of Lake Street. Those in the southeast quadrant believed traffic to be less of a problem than those in the other three quadrants.





Community Participation

Frequency of use of various community amenities or engagement in particular activities was assessed through the interview. Virtually all respondents had made some purchase of a non-food item in Oak Park within the past 12 months; 40% had done so at least twice a month. However, this represents a decrease from 1988, when 47% of respondents said they shopped in Oak Park for non-food items twice a month or more. Over half of the survey respondents had made two or more purchases over the Internet.

Three quarters had used the Oak Park public libraries more than once, and one in five respondents were frequent users, utilizing the public libraries more than 26 times in the past year. Over half of those surveyed had taken advantage of the Park District Recreation Centers at least two times.

Relatively few had watched Village programming on cable television; just over a quarter had watched a Board meeting, public meeting, or other programming related to Village matters two or more times in the past year.





Shopping in Oak Park


Information about shopping in Oak Park is important to the Village of Oak Park because it is a key factor in quality of life for residents, and commercial enterprises generate revenues for funding of critical public services. Greater detail about the shopping patterns of residents, and their opinion of the shopping experience in Oak Park is provided in this section.

Those who had purchased non-food items two or more times in Oak Park were more likely to give positive ratings to the shopping opportunities in Oak Park than those who had never purchased or only purchased one item in Oak Park. This may be because those who like the shopping available here shop here more often, or perhaps those who have shopped here have gotten to know the available stores, and thus rate the shopping opportunities higher.

Some demographic subgroups rated shopping opportunities more positively than did others. There was a correlation between ratings of the shopping opportunities in Oak Park by age, with younger people giving higher average ratings than older people.

Other trends in ratings of shopping opportunities included:


- · Respondents with annual household incomes of \$25,000 or more rated the shopping opportunities more positively than did those with annual household incomes less than \$25,000.
- Respondents who have lived in Oak Park for shorter durations rated the shopping opportunities more positively than did those who have lived in Oak Park for longer durations.
- Renters rated the shopping opportunities more positively (an average rating of 57 on a 100-point scale) than did renters (an average rating of 53 on a 100-point scale).

Among these subgroups, those that rated the shopping opportunities more positively were also more frequent shoppers in Oak Park. (More details can be found in Appendix II.)


Public Information

In addition to being questioned about their participation in various community activities, survey respondents were asked how informed they were about the community, and where they got their information.

Close to a quarter of respondents felt they were very informed about what goes on in Oak Park. Only 17% said they were not very informed.




The proportion of the population that feels informed about Oak Park has declined since 1988, when almost a third said they felt "very informed" about Oak Park matters.

The most common sources of information about the Village of Oak Park are *The Wednesday Journal* and *The Oak Leaves*. About 40% of those surveyed get "a lot" of their news from these sources. Approximately a third get their information from the OP-FYI Newsletter and other Village mailings.

These sources are relatively unchanged since 1988, except that use of *The Oak Leaves* has decreased since 1988, while the utilization of Village mailings has increased.




All the news sources provide more information to those who feel informed about what goes on in Oak Park, but *The Wednesday Journal* is used far more by those who are "very informed" than by those who are "somewhat" or "not very informed" about Oak Park issues.



Four of every five respondents had access to a computer in their home. Most of these also had Internet access at home, so that approximately three-quarters of respondents had access to the Internet from their home.


Home computer usage and Internet access is higher in Oak Park compared to the nation. According the US Department of Commerce, half of US households have a computer, and 41.5% have Internet access.¹







Regardless of whether or not they have Internet access at home, very few survey respondents got "a lot" of their information about Oak Park from the Village of Oak Park Web site. However, a quarter of those with home Internet access get at least some of their information about the community from the website. Only 10% of those who do not have access to the Internet at home have gotten some of their information from the Village Web site.

Home Internet access was also correlated with shopping on-line. Two-thirds of those who can connect to the Internet at home had made two or more purchases from the Internet in the past year, compared to only 14% of those without Internet access at home.


Ratings of Local Government

Much of the survey was devoted to resident perception of local government. Interviewers asked study respondents about their trust in local government and their evaluation of government services.

Public Trust

During the course of the interview, respondents were read two statements about the Village of Oak Park, and asked whether they agreed or disagreed with these statements. The first item asked whether residents were pleased with the overall direction that the Village of Oak Park is taking. Three-quarters of respondents agreed with this statement, and it received an average rating of 70 on a 100-point scale. This is significantly higher than the national norm.

Respondents were also asked whether they thought the Village of Oak Park government welcomes citizen involvement. Three-quarters of respondents agreed with this statement as well, and it also received an average rating of 70 on a 100-point scale.




In 1988, residents participating in the Community Survey were asked how well they felt that the Oak Park Village government represented their interests. While this question is not directly comparable to the questions asked in 2000, similar responses were given; 75% felt the Village government represented their interests "very" or "somewhat well", while 18% thought their interests were "not very well" represented. Seven percent were unsure.



Ratings of Village Services

Approximately two-thirds of survey respondents would rate the overall quality of services provided by the Village of Oak Park as "good". Only 1% would give a "poor" rating to the Village services.



Ratings of overall quality of life in Oak Park were examined by ratings given to overall Village services. These ratings are highly correlated; those who give high ratings to the quality of life in Oak Park also rate the services provided by the Village very positively. A causal relationship cannot be inferred, that is, it cannot be determined from these data whether the provision of high quality services leads to favorable quality of life, but those satisfied with their life in Oak Park are also highly satisfied with the services they receive from their government, while those less happy with their quality of life are also less satisfied with Village service delivery.



The graph on the next page displays the average ratings given to individual services. Where applicable, comparisons have been made to the 1988 Community Survey, and national and peer community norms. Several services were rated by Oak Park residents significantly more positively than the national norm. These services included:

- · Emergency medical services/ambulances
- · Police department services
- · Street cleaning
- · Public health services
- · Water and sewer services
- · Street lighting
- · Crime prevention services
- · Animal control

No service ratings were significantly lower than the national norms. Street repair received a lower rating in 2000 compared to 1988, dropping from an average rating of 61 to 57 on a 100-point scale.






Public Safety Services

Perceptions of public safety services did not vary significantly by location within the Village of Oak Park, with the exception of fire services. Respondents residing the southeast quadrant gave a lower rating on average than those living in other parts of the Village, while those in the northwest quadrant gave higher ratings on average.





Those who rate the services provided by the police more positively are less likely to feel "unsafe" from crime. The graph below shows the proportions of those who feel "unsafe" from violent crime by ratings given to police services and crime prevention services. A similar pattern is observed when the feelings of safety from property crime are examined. Likewise, those who gave less favorable ratings to police services were more likely to view crime as an "extreme" or "major" problem in Oak Park.


As with police services, those who gave more favorable ratings to fire services were also less likely to feel "unsafe" from fires.

Maintenance Services

There were several differences by location within the Village in perceptions of the quality of maintenance services. Street repair was given somewhat lower ratings by those who live north of Lake Street compared to those who live south of Lake Street. Sidewalk repairs were given more positive average ratings by those who live in the southwest quadrant.



Other Services

The remaining services were also examined by location. Public health services were rated higher by those who live north of Lake Street than by those who live south of Lake Street. Parking services were viewed more negatively by those who dwell east of East Avenue compared to those who reside west of East Avenue.


There were no statistically significant differences in ratings of overall service delivery by the Village of Oak Park by geographical area.


Traffic and Parking Issues


Several items on the survey dealt with travel and parking issues within Oak Park, and the results are often correlated. For example, those who think traffic is an extreme or major problem in Oak Park give much lower ratings to traffic enforcement than those who are not as concerned about the traffic in Oak Park.


Ratings of ease of bicycle travel in Oak Park were strongly correlated with opinions about traffic enforcement and traffic. Those who thought traffic was a problem, or who gave lower ratings to traffic enforcement were also inclined to regarded bicycle travel less favorably.








Those who give negative ratings to Oak Park's parking services were also much more likely to view parking in Oak Park as a problem.

While all respondents felt that, on average, parking was a "moderate" to "major" problem, those who rented their housing unit, or who lived in a structure with 4 or more housing units gave even lower ratings to "parking" as a problem, considering it a "major" or "extreme" problem (see Appendix II) compared to those who own their home, or live in structures with 3 or fewer housing units. Likewise, these same groups, renters and those in multi-family housing, gave lower average ratings to parking services than did those who own their homes, or live in structures with 3 or fewer housing units.








Ratings of Village Employees

All respondents were asked whether they had had any contact, by phone or in-person, with a Village of Oak Park employee within the past year. About three-quarters said they had. This proportion is quite similar to that found in the 1988 Community Survey, when 70% of respondents reported having had contact with Village Hall. Further inquiries were made of these individuals about their impression of Village employees.




Most residents who had contact with a Village employee were favorably impressed. A third thought the employees were "excellent", and 44% thought they were "good".

Comparisons of the ratings given by Oak Park residents to local government employees compared to the national norms show that Oak Park employees are perceived as more courteous and more responsive than local government employees overall.

There were some differences among various demographic subgroups on their average ratings of Village employees. Younger respondents were less positive than were older respondents, renters were less positive than owners, and new residents (residing in Oak Park 2 years or less) were less positive than longer-term residents. (See Appendix II for more information.)

Ratings of Services from Other Local Jurisdictions

Residents of Oak Park are served by several governmental jurisdictions other than the Village of Oak Park. Some of the services provided by these other entities were evaluated as a part of the Community Survey. All of these services received average ratings significantly higher than the national norms. However, library services and public school ratings have fallen since 1988.





Those who had used the Oak Park public libraries 2 or more times in the past year gave higher ratings on average to Oak Park's library services than did those who had used the libraries less than 2 times in the past year.



Issues Facing Oak Park

Several questions were included on the questionnaire that are of current, topical interest within the Village of Oak Park. These included items designed to elicit opinions about the overnight parking ban, diversity, and economic development.


Overnight Parking Ban

Survey participants were asked whether they thought the Village of Oak Park should eliminate the current ban on overnight parking. Almost twice as many people supported continuing the ban on overnight parking as favored eliminating it. In 1988, 20% of respondents to the Community Survey favored eliminating the ban, 10% wanted to retain the ban, and 50% preferred to "modify" the ban.

There were large differences in opinions based on whether respondents owned or rented their residence. As shown in the graph below, two-thirds of renters supported elimination of the ban, while only a third of owners did so.


Other differences between demographic subgroups were also observed. These included:

- · More than half of younger people (aged 44 or younger) supported elimination of the parking ban, while fewer than half of older people (aged 45 or older) supported elimination of the parking ban.
- · A majority of African Americans supported elimination of the parking ban (59%) while less than half of Whites (40%) or people of "Other" races (44%) supported elimination of the parking ban.
- People who live in structures with 1 to 3 housing units were much less likely to support elimination of the parking ban (31%) compared to those who lived in structures with 4 or more housing units (61%).
- · A majority of those who have lived in Oak Park for 5 years or less supported elimination of the ban, while a majority of those who have lived in Oak Park 6 or more years opposed elimination of the parking ban.

Diversity


One of the distinctive features of Oak Park is its historic commitment to diversity. Resident viewpoints about the openness of the community towards people of diverse backgrounds, and their perceptions about interactions between people of different races were sought through the questionnaire. While these aspects of community life were generally rated favorably (see pages 13 and 14), differences by respondents' racial background were observed. African Americans gave lower ratings on average to these characteristics than did Non-Hispanic Whites or those of other racial backgrounds.



People of different racial and ethnic backgrounds give similar ratings, however, to the overall quality of life in the Village of Oak Park, and to the "sense of community" in Oak Park. (See Appendix II.)


Several questions addressed the issue of diversity in Oak Park. Overwhelmingly residents believe that an ethnically diverse community is very important (71%). This is an even greater proportion than in 1988, when 50% of respondents felt that it was "very important" to maintain an ethnically diverse community.






More than three-quarters of respondents consider it necessary to continue the promotion of racial and ethnic diversity in Oak Park. This, too, is a greater percentage than found in 1988, when 67% of respondents felt that promotion of diversity was still needed.


Almost all of those who had moved to Oak Park because of its diversity rated having a community that is racially and ethnically diverse as "very important".





Those who live east of East Avenue were even more likely (80% or more) to say promoting racial and ethnic diversity was still needed than were those who lived west of East Avenue.





While African Americans were more likely to be in favor of continued promotion of diversity in Oak Park, and to rate it as very important, there were no statistically significant differences in the average ratings given to "racial balance in the schools" as a problem among people of different racial backgrounds.



Appendix II shows additional information on the average ratings given to "racial balance in the schools" as a problem by other demographic subgroups. Households with children age 12 or younger gave similar ratings as did households without children age 12 or younger. However, households with teenagers were slightly more likely to rate the racial balance in schools as a problem (56 on a 100-point scale) compared to households without teenagers (62 on a 100-point scale). Households with children or with teenagers were also more likely to feel that it is important to have a racially and ethnically diverse community.





Economic Development


When asked what they felt the effect of economic development has been on the overall quality of life in Oak Park, close to three-quarters responded that the effect has been a positive one.



When asked about the effect of economic development on residential property, a majority felt positively about the impact.




A majority of survey respondents who own their home consider the effect of economic development on residential property to be "positive", compared to just under half of those who rent their home.



In general, residents are satisfied with the efforts of the Village of Oak Park to promote economic development.



Those who view positively the shopping available in Oak Park are also more likely to feel that economic development has a positive impact on quality of life, and to be satisfied with the Village's economic development efforts.

Appendix III: Survey Methodology

Sampling

A telephone survey of a random sample of households in the Village of Oak Park was selected as the most efficient method to achieve a representative sample. As over 90% of households in the United States have telephones, phone surveying is an effective and efficient way to reach a population.

Approximately 3,900 randomly selected phone numbers were purchased for the Oak Park area from a company specializing in phone survey services. The numbers were generated using Oak Park prefixes and then adding the last four digits from a random number generator. If blocks of numbers were known to be unavailable, no numbers were generated from these blocks. The use of random numbers allowed for unlisted telephone numbers to be selected for the survey, thereby providing a more representative sample of the population. The numbers are also screened for known business numbers and some screening of disconnected numbers is completed before interviewing begins.

Survey Administration

Phone interviews were conducted from September 11, 2000 through September 27, 2000. A majority of the interviews were completed during the evening hours and on weekends. All phone numbers were dialed at least three times before being taken out of the sample, with at least one of the attempts on either a weekend or weekday evening. Final dispositions of all calls are displayed in the table in the next section. A copy of the survey instrument can be found in Appendix IV.

Response Rate and Confidence Intervals

Of the 2,994 eligible households², 802 completed the interview providing a response rate of 27%. Approximately 22% of eligible households refused the survey. The table on the next page displays the dispositions given to each phone number in the sample.

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a "level of confidence" (or margin of error). The 95 percent confidence level for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus 3 ½ percentage points around any given per cent reported³. The confidence intervals are larger around estimates for subgroups.

² "Eligible" households refer to phone numbers that belong to a residence within Oak Park that are not a fax, business or disconnected. Numbers never reached are assumed to be eligible residences in the same proportion as phone numbers that were contacted.

³ The margin of error was calculated using the following formula: 1.96 * square root (0.25/802). This margin of error is calculated in the most conservative way. The standard error was assumed to be the greatest for a binomial distribution: 50%/50%.

Weighting the Data

The demographic characteristics of the sample were compared to those of the Village as reflected in the 1990 Census and Planning Division estimates. Survey results were statistically adjusted to reflect the larger population when necessary.

Generally, only two variables can be used in a weighting scheme, as the Census data are not broken down in sufficient detail. For this survey, three were chosen, resulting in an imperfect, although very close, correction for the weighting variables.

The two socioeconomic characteristics that showed the largest differences in opinion and behaviors between the groups were age and type of housing unit. There were statistically significant differences by race as well, thus, survey responses were weighted by these three variables. Other discrepancies between the whole population and the sample were also aided by the weighting due to the intercorrelation of many socioeconomic characteristics, although the percentages are not the same in the sample compared to the population norms. The results of the weighting scheme are presented in the table on the next page.

Data Analysis

The surveys were analyzed using the SPSS statistical package. For the most part, frequency distributions and average (mean) ratings are presented in the body of the report. Anova and chi-square tests of significance were applied to breakdowns of selected survey questions by demographic subgroups. A "p-value" of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between subgroups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed are "real". Where differences were statistically significant, they are so noted.
